



At BCCA, we work towards developing highly motivated students capable of meeting and overcoming challenges through exceptional academic competency, character development, athletic endeavors, artistic exposure and community involvement.

We offer a refreshing alternative to methodical education, ensuring that our children become participants more than spectators inside the classroom and in the world in general. We utilize a mixed curriculum, using the best of different educational programs. We are supported by teachers who have a proven passion for education with even greater passion for the love of God. With these, our children will be better equipped to handle the rigors of higher learning in the coming years.

CURRICULUM M

MIDDLE SCHOOL

Physical education is designed to help each student develop and maintain an acceptable level of physical fitness through a variety of exercises, sports, and cooperative games. This program focuses on equipping students with good sportsmanship, teamwork, and positive skill development.

Pre-Robotics introduces students to electrical engineering principles through applications of semiconductor devices and circuits. Students will also be expose to LOcoRobo robotics and mechanical engineering concepts. Upon completion, students should be able to construct, analyze, verify, and troubleshoot various circuits, robotic mechanisms, and code. IPAD is required.

In language arts, students will review and learn the writing traits. Many writing genres will be covered and conventions will be reinforced throughout the year. The students will be able to identify poetic elements and create a poetry portfolio reflecting upon their writing. Students will learn the basic skills to write various types of essays. Vocabulary will be expanded through Word of the Day. Students will have ongoing opportunities to present their work throughout the year.

Life science is the study of all living creatures and the environment that contributes to their way of life. This course is designed to provide the student with an extensive base of knowledge, understanding, and appreciation in this field. This includes the studies of the various cells in our body, organisms, plants, and the human body.



LITERATURE

This course focuses on active reading and writing while making the reading/writing connection through text-to-text, text-to-self, and text-to-world reflections. Students will read at least three novels and a variety of short stories as well as independent reading. There is a strong emphasis on reading comprehension, strategies for higher-level thinking, and reflecting upon their reading.

The curriculum of Math covers numerous areas including problemsolving, decimals, multiplication and division, fractions, geometry, probability, and algebra.

The purpose of Bible Class is to encourage students to explore their faith and their relationship with God and with one another. Students use a student book that encourages active learning. This will explore God's Word, focusing on major accounts of the Bible, starting with Creation and continuing through Jesus's ascension. Students will use the NIV Bible.

This course covers a wide variety of subjects beginning with ancient civilizations including Mesopotamia, Egypt, Greece, Rome, and India. During this time, students will also mummify chickens and participate in the Roman Games. Throughout the course, the students will do a variety of hands-on activities during each unit.

We welcome your input and feedback and welcome the opportunity to meet with you if you have any questions or concerns about our disciplinary policies and procedures.



NON-INCLUSIVE GENERAL RULES AND EXPECTATIONS

- Demonstrate responsible behavior in the luncharea
- and use good table manners; Clean the table and floorarea when finishedeating or after activities
- Talk quietly and be courteous
- No bullying, harassment, or teasing other students

- Foodand drinks are NOT allowedin play areas or classrooms outside of designated snack or lunch times. The only exception to this is water bottles.


DETENTION BASICS



We believe in giving every chance possible for an improvement in character and behavior, just as Christ gives mercy and grace to us. However, we also believe in personal accountability for behavior and actions. We thank you for your cooperation in molding and shaping our students to exhibit Christ-like behavior and be an example of God's love to the world.

The Academy will use our core values to actively and consistently teach positive Christian behavior and to dissuade all types of bullying. Students who bully will be subject to the disciplinary process layout in the student handbook.

Bullying is unwanted, aggressive behavior among school aged children that involves a real or perceived power imbalance. The behavior is repeated, or has the potential to be repeated, over time.

TYPICAL ROLES INVOLVED IN BULLYING

- Target: receiver of hurtful behavior
- Bully: one who harms another(emotionally, physically, or electronically), or takes part in bullying
- Passive bystander: one who sees the bullying occur and does not try to stop it
- Protector: active witnessing, positive responder, helper

BULLYING (FROM THE NEW BULLY FREE CLASSROOM BY ALLAN BEANE, PHD, 2011)

- Bullying is a form of aggressive behavior that is intentional, hurtful, and repeated.
- The person who bullieshas more powerthat the personwho is targeted.
- The mistreatment is intentional.
- The mistreatment is hurtful(physically or psychologically). The mistreatment occursmore than once.
- There is an imbalanceof power (physical, psychological, or social.) The target has difficulty defending himself or herself.

BULLYING PREVENTION

The best way to prevent bullying is talk about it starting from early childhood through high school, build safe school environments, and create community-wide prevention strategies. Help students understand bullying, keep the lines of communication open, encourage students to do what they love, and model how to treat others.

WARNING SIGNS A CHILD HAS BECOME A TARGET

Possible warning signs that a child is being bullied include:

- Comes home with torn, damaged, or missing pieces of clothing, books, or other belongings
- Has unexplained cuts, bruises, and scratches
- Has few, if any friends, with whom he or she spends time
- Seems afraid of going to school, or taking part in organized activities with peers
- Has lost interest in schoolwork or suddenly begins to do poorly in school
- Appears sad, moody, teary, or depressed when they come home
- Complains frequently of headaches, stomachaches, or other physical ailments
- Has trouble sleeping or has frequent bad dreams
- Experiences a loss of appetite
- Appears anxious and suffers from low self-esteem

Due to the recent misuse of social media in our society and school, we ask that parents do not allow their students to create or maintain social media profiles or accounts, such as Facebook or Tik Tok, until they are of the legal age to do so. We have seen an increase in accounts created that break the site guidelines, such as age restrictions.

When at school or on school property, the use of technology such as cellphones and iPads, is not allowed outside of approved academic instruction, or unless authorization is received from the teacher or administration.

We can only control what happens at school. Parents are responsible for what happens at home. However, what happens at home can influence what happens at school. Therefore, please help us ensure a safe and nurturing academic environment for your student.



DRESS CODE POLICY





SPECIFIC DRESS CODE EXPECTATIONS

The dress code at BCCA is designed to reflecta business casual appearance. All clothing line items are to be purchased in the Campus Store Daily attire.

INJURIES AND UNIFORM EXPECTATIONS

Students are required to wear their uniforms even when injured. A doctor's note DOES NOT automatically guarantee the right of a student to circumvent the dress code.

SPIRIT FRIDAY DRESS CODE EXPECTATIONS

Some special Fridays duringthe academic year are designated as Fridays that permit a relaxed dress code. You will be notified when these days occur.

CO-CURRICULAR ACTIVITIES DRESS-UP EXPECTATIONS

All students must have permission from the coach/moderator and administration to participate in the cocurricular dress up days. This means that students should look better than the normal dress code. At no time are any sweatshirts. hoodies.or anything made from sweatshirt material or denim allowed. The attire consists of:

SPIRIT WEEKS AND "FREE DRESS" DAY EXPECTATIONS

On occasion, special dress days are permitted. Dress is according to the themes dictated by the special day or week. It is the responsibility of the parent to make sure their children come dressed in their appropriate uniform and have clean, neatly groomed hair. Please help your child avoid the embarrassment of being sent to the office for improper dress.

INFRACTIONS OF THE UNIFORM POLICY ARE AS FOLLOWS:

- 3rd offense or more

email or verbal warning note and/or email home to parents students will not be allowed to participate in classroom activities until dressed appropriately.

Some violations of the dress code may be deemed severe enough to warrant immediate attention. In these cases, the administration may decide on a more appropriate consequence to resolve the problem.

Brilliant Child conducts monthly emergency drills, both in conjunction with the Las Vegas Fire Department and independently as needed. These drills include, but are not limited to, evacuation, earthquake, shelter-in-place, and lockdown. Nevada laws require bi-monthly fire, lock-down and shelter-in-place drills. These drills may be conducted by the Clark County Fire Department or by the Academy. Students are expected to cooperate in a quiet and prompt manner, according to the procedures implemented by the Academy.

REGULATIONS FOR STUDENT CONDUCT

ATTENDANCE POLICIES

BrilliantChild Christian Academyis required to provide an appropriate number of instructional days. Students are expected to be present, punctual, and ready to learn at all times. It is very difficult, if not impossible, for the staff or student to maximize potential for those students who are excessively absent.

GENERAL ABSENCE POLICIES

- Students are required to make up all class work missed during an excused absence.
- In accordance with BCCA policies, all students are still required to have a parent verify all absences, even if they are of legal adult age.
- All absences must be excused by the parents within 3 school days. Parents who have not excused the absence will be contacted by the school the day of the absence. Students who return to school after an absence withoutparental excuse will be considered truant.
- Truancy: non-validated absences for all or part of a day; they are subject to disciplinary action.
- Students are required to make up class work assignments for most absences. Full credit will be given in most cases. However, one notable exception is truancy, where the grade will be lowered based on the absences.
- Students who miss more than five minutesof a class will be marked absentfrom that class.

TARDY POLICY

It is the responsibility of the parent to have their children at the Academy and seated in class seated at least 5 minutes prior to the time class starts. Tardies are tracked on a quarterly basis and will affect grading. At the discretion of the administration, a child exceeding3 tardies per quarterwill be subject to our discipline policy:

- 3 tardies or unexcused absences will be issued a 30-minute detention; 6 tardies or unexcused absences will be issued a 1-hour detention
- Anything over 6 tardies or unexcused absences in one quarter may be subject to a 1-day suspension as decided by administration

Note: The cumulative tardy count resets at the beginning of each quarter. This, however, is not an excuse for tardies.

Reminder: Any student arrivinglate must get a tardy slip from the office.

- Students, who are late twice within a week, or four times within a month, will be considered "habitual." The parents of the students will then be notified through a written letter and/or a Parent-Counselor meeting will be arranged to address these concerns.
- Whenever a student arrives more than 60 minutes after the start time, or leaves more than 60 minutes before the end of the Academy day, it will be considered a half-day absence.
- If a child reaches 15 absences in the Academic year, a required parent conference will be scheduled with either the Director or the Curriculum coordinator. A child exceeding 15 absences in the Academic year may be suspended, dismissed from the Academyor may not progress to the next grade level.
- Homework requests must be emailed to your child's teacher and received by 10:00 am and must be picked up by 6:00 pm on the same day.

ABSENCE POLICY

Regular attendance is important if the student is to benefit from the daily activities in class and promotes a successful and holistic development of training and discipline. A student who has been absent from the Academy is responsible for the lessons that were taken up during their absence. It is the responsibility of the student and the parent to arrange for make-up work. Accountability is essential.

The Academy does not give make-up lessons for students who missed classes for any reason at all. In cases of absence not due to illness, the student should present a explanation letter signed by the parents or authorized guardians.

For the welfare of students, the Academy verifies all absences. Parents are asked to confirm all absences by calling the Academy at least one hour prior to the start of classes.

Parents are required to apply for a leave of absenceif their childis to be absent from Academy for more than two days, when not illness-related. A substantial amount of absences would deprive the student of the learning experiences the Academy has prepared for them over the course of the Academicyear. Please be aware and mindful of this.











